Soloists from the brass section also will be featured. They are Doug Bayne, Leo Mueller, Jim Gregg and Roger Falco on trumpet.

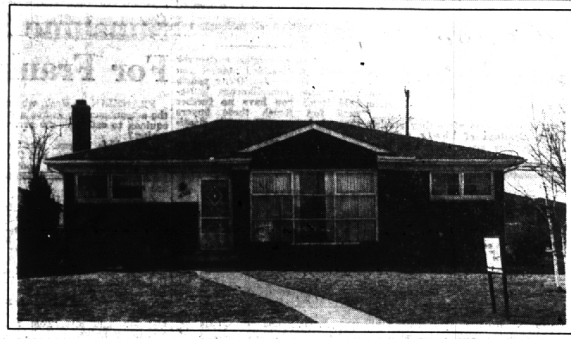
Bill Satterly, Bill Campbell, Larry Layne, and Earl Zoss will play trombones.
