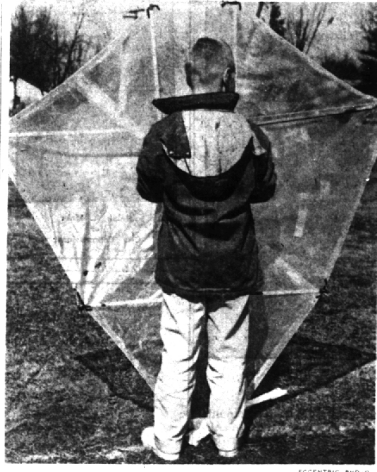

B'ham Asked To Dedicate Some Parks

An inventory of city parks has been taken and progress is being made toward dedicating them, a homogeneity group was told by Birmingham city commissioners Monday night.
In a letter to the commission, John McPherson, president of Sheffield Estates Civic Association, inquires as to the status of this inventory.
The association, he said, "is pursuing a policy of urging that selected city-owned property be dedicated as parks. We are primarily interested in such properties that are now serving as parks."
City Manager R. L. Gore and Commissioner William H. Burgum, who also is a member of the city recreation board, explained that all pieces of public property are being examined legally in respect to dedication.

JOHN MCGILL, representative of the association, said the city "has good parks now but not enough to handle the per capita area up to 1968."
He added, "We should make sure we keep the parks we now have and not let them be used for some other purpose."
The inventory was started a year ago upon request of the Senior Men's Club.
Commissioner Charles Renfrew commented, "This matter is under sustained attention."
He suggested that "the people have a little more confidence" in the commission and its intentions.
McGill said his group has confidence in the present commission but asked, "Who knows about future commissions?"

COMMISSIONER Robert Pace requested that a report on dedication — not actual dedication — be made by the city administration in 30 to 60 days.
Some of the city's parks are now restricted to use as parks but none are dedicated as such.
If not dedicated, they can, conceivably, be used for some other municipal purpose or be sold, it was explained.

HENRY HOGAN
Hogan Ends GM Service

"I'm going to clean the attic." This was Henry Hogan's way of saying he hasn't yet decided what he'll do now that he has retired from General Motors.
A vice president and general counsel for the auto firm, Hogan began his employment with GM in the legal department in 1926, when the corporation was only 12 years old.

In 17 YEARS he rose to assistant general counsel and in 1941 he was elected a vice president. He had served as general counsel since 1947.
When the Fordham Law Alumni Association conferred its Medal of Achievement upon Hogan on Feb. 11, Caesar L. Pittassy, association president, said that during his GM career Henry Hogan has been called upon to participate in as many kinds of legal work as any lawyer and has again and again demonstrated his remarkable legal ability and excellent business judgment.
