

Churches Await Easter Services

Rector Offers Easter Theme

Editor's Note: In answer to The Rector's request the Rev. Kenneth H. Gass, D.D., rector at St. James Episcopal Church, offers the following Easter messages.

This past year has been one of intense excitement and anxiety in the affairs of men. Each day was met with concern—total war had been won and is in the offing. The tremendous advancement that has been made in the field of rockets and guided missiles has made man aware of the imminence of destruction. Peace and security seem to be available on the awful basis of retaliation, a peace made from fear. Events seem to be out of control.

We cry peace when there is no real peace—and we begin to see that those who live by the sword may perish by the sword.

Now on Easter Day, the Christ proclaims to the world that death and evil—fear and despair—need not be the lot of man. The affairs of men need not be out of control; men's hearts may fail them for fear, but God is in His Heaven. He alone is unmoved. He alone is unshaken.

FOR THE LESSER minds on Golgotha, all seemed to have been completed. Satan and his host seemed to have won the battle. The Christ had been crucified and His followers scattered.

Then on Easter morn, the cry went up, "He is Risen!" "He is Risen indeed!" — And through the ages has echoed down through the truth. The will of God for mankind has survived the devastation.

It is this truth we desperately need as we stand before the sepulchre. We need to admonish ourselves, not all the confusion, chaos and futility, not to be afraid, not to look to the earth, not to seek the living among the dead, but to hear and believe "That He is not here, but He is Risen."

This is the Good news. Our trust in God is reaffirmed in the Risen Christ, for evil did not triumph, for He on these evil days that the disciples became new men.

men, fearless men for the Kingdom, suffering persecution and death, but never again falling in their trust—in the trust the Master had shown them, which was complete in His Resurrection on Easter Day.

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Youth Plan Easter Sacrifice

Youth of the Congregational Church in Birmingham (United Church of Christ) will give up their Easter vacations from school next week to work in Detroit. Not only will they be giving up their vacations but also they will be paying to work—enough to cover the expenses of the trip.

Armed with brushes, paint brushes and plastering equipment, the church's teenagers are chaperoned by the Rev. and Mrs. Mead M. Bailey will assist the young people of Plymouth Congregational Church (United Church of Christ) in renovating their Christian Education building.

Aside from work during the daylight hours, the week-long trip, which begins Easter Sunday, will feature evening educational programs, including speakers, demonstrations and field trips, and a day-long tour of Detroit.

KNOWN AS the annual Pilgrim Fellowship spring trip, the program provides young people of the parish an opportunity to spend a month differing from that which they call home.

New members from 1955 under the direction of the Rev. Robert D. Dewey, trips have taken over 80 teenagers to various cities in Chicago and Cleveland for work camp activity to inter-city church programs.

Recognizing that the same experience found by groups in the past could be gained by working in the downtown Detroit area, and realizing that the needs in their own back-yard are as great as

those in New York or Chicago, this year's group voted to "go to Detroit."

"WE ARE EVEN more enthusiastic about Detroit than we were about other cities considered," said Judie Burns, president of the church's Pilgrim Fellowship, "for we realize that the slums in our own area are certainly as needy as those in other communities."

"This year's trip promises to be one of the most significant we have held," said Rev. Bailey. "Aside from the values to be gained from such an inter-racial experience—Plymouth Church being one of our Negro congregations—the participants will be afforded the opportunity to see what drastic changes their own city is undergoing and to grasp to some extent their own roles as responsible Christian citizens."
