Variety of Courses Attract Residents

A variety of night school courses keeps Birmingham areas resistents busy at Seaholm High. The program of two-hour classes of feers over 30 courses covering everything from language to incourse. This variety of study avenues accounts for almost a 90 per cent increase in adult education enrollments over last year.
