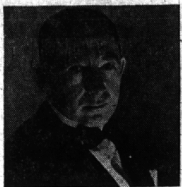


Hypnotist to Appear In Holy Name Program

Dr. Franz J. Polgar, one of the country's leading hypnotists, will appear for the final program of the 1960-61 Holy Name Culture Series May 11 in the Marian High School auditorium, on Lahser Road near 13 Mile.

The final program to be sponsored at 8:30 p.m. by Holy Name Church, Birmingham, is entitled "Mirth, Mystification and Mind-Reading."

Since coming to the United States 25 years ago, Polgar estimates that he has put over a million people to sleep, usually with their willing assistance. Polgar is no medical man. His title represents doctorates in psychology and economics, acquired in his native Hungary. Nevertheless he is convinced hypnosis has many beneficial uses in medical science.

TO INCREASE understanding of his specialty, Dr. Polgar puts on demonstrations of the art to nearly 300 audiences a year. He has appeared on several television shows, including those of Jack Paar, Gary Moore and Dave Garraway.

Polgar also claims a faculty for "mind reading"—the transference of thought from one person to another.
