

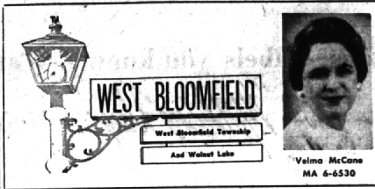
Course Offered To Book Lovers
