

## Steam Passenger Train Runs to Muskegon Je 4

The National Museum of Steam Propulsion will sponsor a "Steam Giant Rumble" over the Grand Trunk Western Railroad from Detroit to Muskegon with return the same day, June 4.

This "Rumble" will commemorate the last steam-powered passenger train run between Detroit and Muskegon over the Grand Trunk Western Railroad.

Never before has the GTW operated a large No. 6300 series steam locomotive west of Durand to Muskegon.

Steam Locomotive No. 6323 will be the first and the last of the big

No. 6300 series to make the run. Speed picture stops will be made at Ionia, Grand Rapids and Muskegon. A tour of GTW's new roundhouse will be conducted at Muskegon.

TRAIN WILL leave Detroit (Brush St. Station) at 8 a. m., arrive in Grand Rapids at 1:15 p. m. and arrive in Muskegon at 2:35 p. m. The train will leave Muskegon at 4 p. m.

Tickets are available at GTW stations in Detroit, Royal Oak, Birmingham and Pontiac. All fares

include a box lunch.

This is the last year that the Grand Trunk Western Railroad will operate a steam locomotive on an excursion train. When steam locomotive No. 6323 is due for boiler fires in November, she will be scrapped.

THE NATIONAL Museum of Steam Propulsion is issuing founder's certificates to purchase locomotive No. 4070 and save it from being scrapped. These certificates are graciously donated and are suitable for framing. Founder's Certificates are five dollars. However one dollar donations will be accepted for a certificate.

The Museum address is 6087-Rt. 1, Cherry Valley Rd., Middleville, Mich. Purchase of No. 4070 will afford future Michigan generations a chance to see a steam locomotive in action.

He has helped in a joint project on schizophrenia conducted by the Ypsilanti State Hospital and the UM Mental Health Research Institute.

### DOWN TO EARTH

## Give Your Attention To Evergreens Now

Evergreens have priority on your garden service list at this time.

Because they have their greatest cycle of growth from May 1 until June 15 you should give them a radical trim, if needed, at this time. The fast growth will cover up your "sins".

They will need a good feeding with fertilizer at this time. The formula 10-6-4 is good for this purpose.

Also remember they appreciate "cool feet" but must have good drainage; therefore, supply this need by grass clippings, peat moss, or any other mulch you might have handy.

IF YOU are having trouble making your yews appear in prime condition it may be due to poor drainage or scale which will suck the life out of an evergreen.

When you evaluate the plant material on your property remember the evergreen has first priority on your space use and care.

As an illustration, if you have a shrub which is inclined to have its branches grow through the evergreen boughs the shrub should be removed.

With constant interference by the boughs of shrubs your evergreen will drop its needles in that area. So undisturbed temperamental, doesn't it?

THERE IS a new book which you will find invaluable for your gardening program: "Gardening The Easy Way", Edwin F. Steffek, Holt, Rinehart and Winston, \$3.95. This writer is good because the lessons he gives you come through experience.

Steffek takes up the subject of earthworms and whether or not they are killed by chemical fertilizers. The New Jersey Experimental Station has found out that within reasonable limits the heavier application of fertilizer the greater the crop and therefore more earthworms.

These worms simply move down deeper or out of the fertilizer range if disturbed. They are not any more sensitive to fertilizer than the root hairs of a plant.

This author discusses the selection of various categories of plants and their use, supplemented by fine line drawings. This book would be

an excellent housewarming gift for a new home owner.

THIS IS the time to prune your roses now except your climbers, until after you inspect the cane as your parents used to do every spring but only cut off the killed tips and then remove the old cane if it will improve the total profile. My research conducted by the American Rose Society has found that you, the owner will have a larger total of flowers if you follow this ruling.

You do not trim your climbers until after the large crop in June. At this time you inspect the cane pattern near the ground and remove two or three of the largest woody branches at the ground level.

It is true that for a short time your plant will look like a plucked chicken, but it doesn't take long for new branches to grow and compensate for the trimming.

THE CLIMBER, Argentea, looks good to me. It is fragrant, has salmon pink flowers with shades of yellow and copper and red, as the flower is in the bud stage.

Do not overlook the role of the shrub rose in your border of six-foot-high plants. They haven't developed a shrub rose yet to beat the sulphur yellow, Rosa Hugonis.

Guess all gardeners need a quart to keep reminding them not to buy more plants than they have space to plant them. With the new developments in plant structure you are tempted to set your garden up as an experimental station. As an example, Rocket Snapdragon has been developed and they have been selected through very warm, midsummer weather.
