\$23,000 balance carried over.

Road Commissioner Walter L. Kouba has allocated \$9,600 for materials; \$85,000 for new and re-surface construction (the village and state contribute equally to the fund); \$25,500 will be used for road maintenance.

TRAFFIC CONTROL, including new traffic and street signs and maintenance of street lights, is figured for \$4,750. Minor ditching has been estimated at \$4,000. Administration of the road commission totals \$1,900 for salary, mileage and supplies.

The road commission's budget, unlike the village's general and welfare allocations, is figured on a calendar fiscal year to coincide with the state.
