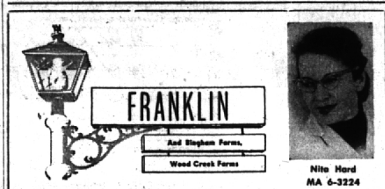




Musicale Entertains WNFGA

Bingham Farms Slates May 22 Budget Hearing

BINGHAM FARMS—Bingham's council approved a proposed budget Monday and set May 22 for a public hearing and its adoption.

A liberal allocation was made for legal expenses to cover the village's fight to defend its zoning code. Some \$2,000 of a \$5,300 general operating fund has been earmarked to this end.

Other items are rubbish \$400; election cost \$450—which provides for a special election due to create a special assessment district for the black-topping of Bristol Lane as well as the annual election; clerk's salary and office expenses, \$500; Michigan Municipal League dues, \$50; publishing and posting legal notices, \$250; insurance, \$300; assessor's expenses, \$50; treasurer's expenses, \$100 and \$200 in a contingency fund.

THE GENERAL highway fund comprised of a balance of \$2,800 and \$5,000 in receipts from the village.

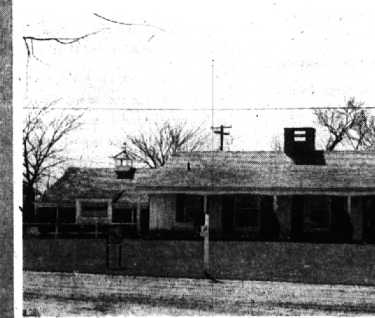

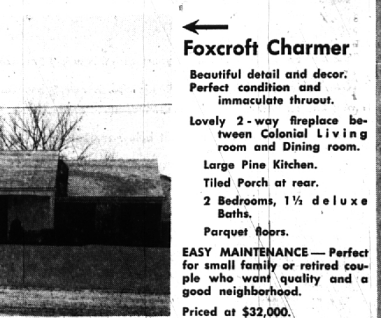
