Divider Creates Double Bedroom

Here's how you tan turn an oversize bedroom into a double bed-room for two children without cut-ting the larger room up into tiny cubicles.

Use a room divider which is fair-ly open, but still defines the two separate areas.

A GOOD WAY to achieve this result is to build identical desks, one on each side of the divider and at opposite ends, but leave the area above the desks open.

In this way, one child can look directly into the other part of the room, but, since the desks are at opposite ends, there is no conflict or diversion when the boys or girls are studying.

THE ROOM devider can have a center panel between the desks with shelves on each side for books and children's toys.

3. After dusting, wash down fireplace with sponge and detergent to remove smoke stains.

4. Polish andirons, and fill fireplace with summer foliage.
