Mayors' Meeting Helpful, Says William Burgum

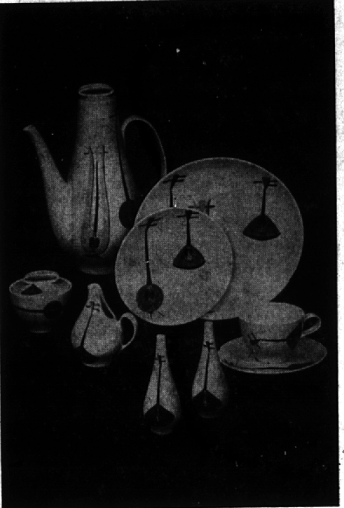
The federal government has many different programs of aid available to municipalities. Birmingham Mayor Pro. Tom William H. Burgum told the city commission Monday night.

via the printed word. This courageous expression of the right of freedom of the press by private companies can, and probably would, pose a threat to those in government who favor the economic and political drift toward Socialism and the Welfare State. So, by a mere departmental ruling, without Congressional legislation at all, the IRS has decided to punish those privately owned companies that spend company money in order to insure their very preservation!

IMAGINE JUST HOW far such a ruling might become effective; this very bit of comment is being printed in a privately owned U.S. newspaper. The cost of writing it of setting it into type, of printing it on a press, of distributing it are ALL DEDUCTED AS A BUSINESS EXPENSE.

This type of comment is, naturally, in sympathy with the right of all business to exercise their presumed Constitutional right to freedom of the press.

Suppose, then, that some day the IRS refused to allow all printed media to include the cost of printing criticism of the federal government's socialistic policies as a business expense... what then would happen to a nation's freedom? (And this ruling, too, could also more easily be applied to radio and television, since both these types of communication depend upon government for licenses to operate.)

I AM WRITING and printing this comment only to point out the dangers always inherent in what people call "The State." Ultimately, if it be left to its own potentially bureaucratic designs, without the controls of an alert and active citizenry to stand guard on the ramparts of freedom, "The State" can and history shows it many times has, become the overlord, the dictator, the tyrant.

Do you want to preserve freedom of speech and of the press in America? Then I suggest that you sign this comment and, with a few added written thoughts of your own, send it to your U.S. Congressman, your U.S. Senator, and even to the White House!

For never forget that the punitive devices of an antagonistic government are ever and forever a constant menace to any nation's freedom!
