Arts Festival Committee To Attend Open House

Preparations for the fourth annual Birmingham Arts Festival will come to a brief halt for an open house Monday. On that day, the co-chairmen of the Bloomfield Association's annual ball, which opens the June festivities, will entertain from 3 to 5 p.m.

West, George Russell and Mrs. Robert Vanderkloof have invited members of the ball and general festival committees to join them at the Russell home on Lone Pine Road, Bloomfield Hills.

GUESTS WILL sample Grecian delicacies, in keeping with the theme of this year's ball, "A Night with the Gods (and Goddesses)." With serious artistic intent, Birmingham area artists and sculptors have been at work for months designing a scene out of Greek mythology. They will locate their modern-day Mount Olympus at Bloomfield Hills Country Club, where the ball and dinner party begins at 8 p.m. Friday, June 16.

At 2 p.m. the following day, the nine-day festival opens officially. Ball invitations designed by artist Rocco DiMarco will go into the mails the day of the open house. The king-size invitations are intended to be decorative enough for wall hangings. They will become collector's items, predicts Clifford West, head of the art department at Kingwood School, Cranbrook.

BOTH WEST and DiMarco are advisors to the ball decorations committee headed by Mrs. Louis E. Dean, of Willow Lane, Birmingham. The committee adopted the Grecian gods and goddesses for their theme on a suggestion made by West, who spent last summer studying in Greece.

West's committee has been meeting regularly in the Russell home—even while Mrs. Russell was in Europe for a month—to prepare the elaborate decorations. With chicken wire, plywood, buckets of paste and newspapers, they made huge Grecian urns to flank the ballroom walls.
