Cranbrook Picks Senior Prefects

The names of the five boys, who have been designated as senior prefects for the '61-'62 school year, were announced in assembly last week. These five are important to school life because it is on them that the largest share of the burden of responsibility is placed. It will be their duty to live up to the high ideals established by former prefects.

Of these five, Barney Crouse, Eric Gordon, Larry Hard, Dave Kessel and Ted Lorch, one will be selected as the head prefect, but his name will be withheld until the Awards Night ceremonies preceding commencement.

MR. DAVIS, head of the Cranbrook mathematics department, announced the results of the Michigan Mathematics Prize Competition. This examination is given to recognize excellence in mathematics.

This year, approximately 9,000 Michigan students from the ninth to the 12th grades took the two-part exam. The 365 best papers were determined on the basis of scores on the first section of the exam, which was a machine graded, objective test. The second and more important section was a subjective test, graded individually, and the results of this section determined placement among the top 365.

Of 14 Cranbrook entries, 11 placed in the top 365, and will receive a certificate of merit presented by the Michigan Actuarial Society.

Those 11 are Michael Barone, Louis Beer, Gregory Carr, Joel Cohen, Mike Hilder, Linn Hobbs, Robert Hughes, George Martin, Joel Meyers, Douglas Smith and Gregory Thomson.

LAST NIGHT 122 Cranbrook students traveled to the Masonic Auditorium in Detroit, where they received 250 awards won in the Detroit News Scholastic Writing Awards Contest. Rick and Mike Russon were first and second, respectively in the individual competition. Rick winning three keys, two honorable mentions and two commendations, and Mike winning three keys, one honorable mention, and one commendation.

The school total included 52 keys, 108 honorable mentions, and 160 commendations; over 24 per cent of the regional total.
