Hogan Assured by Hannah of Ample MSUO Funds

State Rep. Henry M. Hogan (Oakland, 2nd district) today disclosed that he had received "strong assurance" from Michigan State University President John A. Hannah that adequate funds will be made available to finance most MSUO programs for the coming year.

Hogan said there would be sufficient money to operate MSUO's freshman, sophomore and junior classes and to open and operate the university's new buildings when they are completed, according to Hogan's statement.

However, Hogan said "there is some doubt" whether the Oakland County campus will be able to launch its new trimester plan this year.

"Hogan is a Birmingham resident. Dr. Hannah's action is very gratifying," Hogan commented. "Oakland County's four GOP members of the House were convinced that higher education could trim its programs to live within anticipated revenues."

HOGAN ACKNOWLEDGED that "terrible pressure" was put on legislators to reverse their stand and go along with a special \$286,000 line item appropriation for MSUO above the existing increase.

"We disagreed with this position on two points," Hogan explained. "First, the measure lacked sufficient support to be passed. Secondly, there was no doubt in our minds that the existing MSUO allocation would cover MSUO's most urgent needs."

"Dr. Hannah's assurance confirm the soundness of our position," Hogan asserted.

"Republican members of the House were deeply committed to a policy of fiscal responsibility," Hogan said.

"The 1960 election clearly demonstrated that the majority of voters favored an end to deficit spending and a return to pay-as-you-go government that lives within its means."

"REPUBLICANS kept faith with this mandate. It would have been easy to buckle in to pressure from higher education and mental health. But it would have meant an abject string of broken promises," Hogan contended.

He said he has been "keenly aware" of the problems of MSUO.

"But the legislature has two responsibilities—one to higher education and the other to the mandate of the voters. We think we've been able to fulfill both responsibilities within existing budgetary limitations," he stated.

Hogan lauded the record of the current session of the legislature as "history-making."

"We passed the biggest general fund budget in our history—\$462 million, an increase of \$45 million over last year. Yet we didn't levy one cent in new taxes," he said.

"IN FACT the \$50 million in temporary nuisance taxes enacted in 1959 will actually be temporary. They'll expire on schedule June 30. This is nothing less than history-making," Hogan added.

"What we taxpayers must recognize is this: we can't have our cake and eat it too. We can't demand increased services and inflated budgets and in the next breath holler for tax relief."

"The legislature is trying to restore Michigan's fiscal integrity. Any new tax revenue should be used to wipe out our \$65 million deficit."
