Take Sanity Test Of Nelle Lassiter



A motion by Mrs. Nelle Lassiter's attorney for mistrial precipitated a sanity test scheduled to be taken Wednesday of the Beverly Hills woman charged with murder and conspiracy.

A sanity commission of three doctors will testify as to whether Mrs. Lassiter understands the charges against her and if she can aid in her own defense. The commission was appointed by Circuit Judge Joseph G. Rashid.

Prosecution countered with a petition for the sanity test after Joseph W. Louisell, Mrs. Lassiter's attorney, made a motion for a mistrial.

LOUISELL WAS UPSET by the sanity test motion. He observed that under the statute involving the sanity commission Mrs. Lassiter could be committed to a mental institution.

Judge Rashid irritably pointed out that he wishes to explore all possibilities before considering a mistrial.

Mrs. Lassiter is hospitalized in Jennings Memorial Hospital suffering from nervous exhaustion resembling "shell shock." Her physician said it would be a month or six weeks before she could stand trial. Thus Louisell called for a mistrial.

MRS. LASSITER COLLAPSED Monday in the courtroom for the second time in four days, halting the trial for an indefinite period.

A Move To Expand

Closing the door behind one era and beginning a new one for the Bloomfield Art Association is Robert Bender, president. The four-year-old association moved last week to new quarters, the former Birmingham sewage disposal plant at 1516 Cranbrook. Equipment was stored in two rooms of the building, pending arrangement in five classrooms and a gallery when renovation of the interior is completed in mid-September. Old quarters, at 361 North Woodward, which furnished two classrooms that doubled as galleries, are being torn down to make room for Municipal Parking Lot No. 5.

Recommend Property For Multiple Family

Birmingham Plan Board has recommended multiple family zoning for the northerly three-quarters of the Frank Newell property, which presently holds 120 multiple family units.

The triangle of property is bounded by Klou on the east, the Grand Trunk Railway on the west and Maple on the south. Newell's property was ordered zoned for business by circuit court five years ago, and the City lost its appeal to the State Supreme Court. The City and the Pembroke Manor Improvement Association had wanted the property zoned residential.

MULTIPLE FAMILY ZONING would make the property compatible to the rest of Newell's property and the surrounding residential area.

Consideration of zoning the southerly one-quarter of that property as neighborhood business will be taken up with Newell at the June meeting.

plan board meeting is the request for vacation of Martin St., between Southfield and Chester. The plan board requested a report from the Birmingham Board of Education about the use of the property so that access to Baldwin School will not be cut off.

PROPERTY OWNERS, Mrs. James Allen and Mary Frawley, requested the vacation. The school board is the third owner.

In other action, the plan board temporarily denied Hubert G. Smith's request for re-zoning his property on the southwest corner of Adams and Hazel until Smith rectifies an alleged violation of the building code under the present zoning.

Smith requested that his property be rezoned from single family residential to neighborhood business.

THE BOARD ALSO informed George H. Glover that his request for permission to build a 10-story apartment near the center of the city is tabled until such time that there is a provision made for multiple apartment building in the Central Business Development plan.

No Necessity For Extending Kenwood Court

There will be no extension of the east end of Kenwood Court in the northwest corner of Birmingham, city commissioners decided last week.

They declared no necessity, following a public hearing. It had been proposed to extend the street eastward 652 feet at a width of 50 feet to allow access to a new home being built by Obari Bros.

Adjacent property owners objected to the special assessment that would ensue if the street were to be extended.

OBERTI BROS. had been granted a building permit by the City but had no access to the property concerned. A curb cut was then granted.

The property owners involved have been unable to negotiate a settlement of the problem of providing access to the new home without cutting across property of the neighboring homes.
