**Lutheran Churches Consolidate**

Michigan Synod of the United Lutheran Church in America approved merger of the United Lutheran Church in America, the American Evangelical Lutheran Church, the Augustana Evangelical Lutheran Church and the Finnish (Suomi) Evangelical Lutheran Church during its 107th annual convention Monday through Wednesday in Dearborn.

The Synod also voted to merge seminaries of the same four bodies. The United Lutheran Church recommended that the consolidation of the Joint Commission on Lutheran Unity be adopted by the Synod at its 22nd biennial convention.

Four newly-organized congregations were received into the Synod, including First of Glory Lutheran Church, Madison Heights.

**Schedule Second Carillon Concert**

Kirk in the Hills second carillon concert of the season will be staged at 4 p.m., May 21. Philip Steinhaus, organist and choirmaster at the church, 1340 West Long Lake Road, Bloomfield Hills, will play the 77-bell Kirk carillon in a program devoted to the works of Bach, Van den Gheyn, Jean Miller and Leet's Hart. The towering Kirk carillon, ranked as the world's largest in total number of bells, was formally dedicated on May 15, 1950. The bells, which weigh a total of 68,900 pounds, took nearly a year to manufacture and three months to install. They were manufactured in Holland and are suspended in eight rows on a massive steel framework within the 200-foot Kirk Tower.
