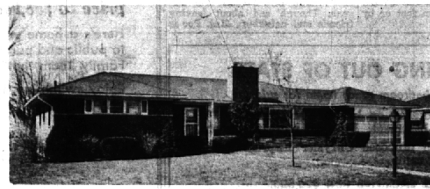

FRANKLIN — There are four foreign imports running around without spare wheels these days so Franklin Village Players can have a "teap" in their May 19 and 20 and 26 and 27 production of "Teahouse of the August Moon". Circumventing the load problems of having a real car on the second floor stage of the Farmington Players Barn, Oliver Garwood built a light-weight model using Opel wheels to achieve the proper scale. They'll also have a live goat filling the role of Lady Astor. Thanks to the spontaneous friendship that developed between child actor, David Price and Saki the goat, rehearsals have progressed without incident. Even the wrestling scenes will have an authentic touch to them because ex-policeman Dr. Lloyd McKinney imparted a few pointers on the art of judo.

So, when the bamboo curtains part at 8:30 p.m. tomorrow night, it will be just what the doctor ordered — director, Dr. Evelyn Siver, that is. A former WSU professor of theater arts, Mrs. Siver is the first "pro" director for Players. After years of directing her debut in community theater. While there is no question the cast of 19 has learned a great deal from her, there is also little question that the relaxed informal attitude of amateurs has been quite a lesson for the teacher.

Assisted by Mrs. Phil Price, Mrs. Siver's deft handling of the difficult production also benefited from the dedicated efforts of production manager Mrs. John Baker Jr.

Tricky sets were planned and constructed by Robert Mitchell, Phil Price and Chet Hard. Mrs. John McLean heads the makeup crew and Mrs. Len Madge, props. Miss Tillie Duncan supply him with the necessary equipment. A strict disciplinarian, Director Tom Brooks no foolhardiness at rehearsals. He has managed to keep the large squirming cast in line without much adult intervention. If an actor misbehaves badly at rehearsal, Tom calls the parents and reports that the child is "not cooperating" as expected. This attains the desired results.

PROUD BUT BEWILDERED, the Saponaros are struggling to maintain some semblance of normality in their home, which is in a state of turmoil when Tom launches a production. Amid dashing around to secure the right kind of paper, recording or whatever—they insist Tom keep up his homework.

A poor speller and disinterested mathematician, the youthful producer is apt to get lost in his art. His parents risk tears and argument in the interest of preparing Tom for the practical side of life. A difficult task for the faculty at Franklin school is refraining from making too many concessions for the determined charmer. Although Tom is allowed to work on his play during art and music class because the show is an expression of these two subjects, he was required to join his class on a nature hike despite pleadings to be excused so he could work on the sound tape of his show.

ALTHOUGH HE STILL is just a youth who takes his play-acting more seriously than most, someday perhaps the name Tom Saponaro will flash from a real theater marquee.
