The program, a film entitled "For Service Rendered," gave a picture of how the National Girl Scout registration fee is used. It gave a thumbnail sketch of serv-

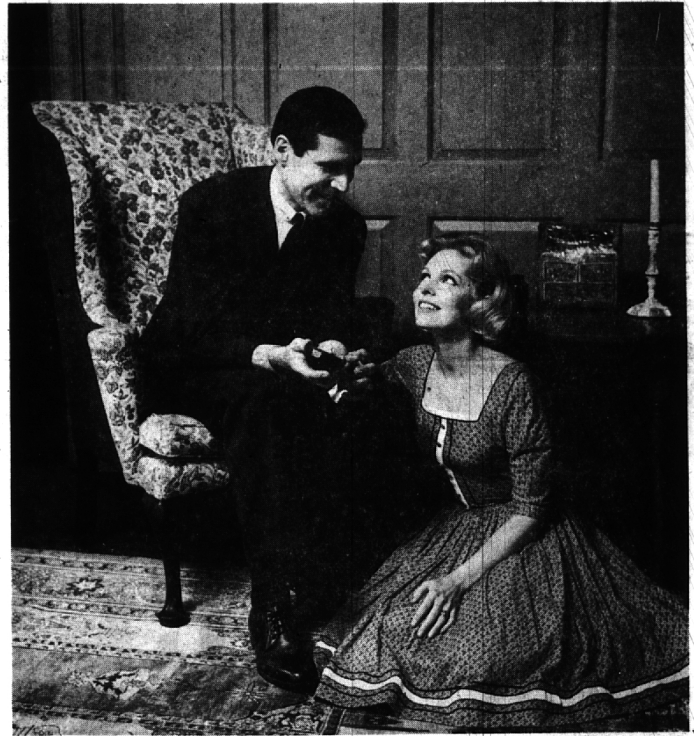
ices available to local troops such as literature, resources, conservation information, exhibits, public relations information and film of how to run troop and neighborhood.
