Birmingham-Bloomfield Hills Society Notes

There's a real live poet coming to our town!
He's even won a Pulitzer prize for his poetry last year!
His name is William De Witt Snodgrass (De for short).
He teaches at Wayne State University and he will be in our town the evening of June 22 in conjunction with the Birmingham Arts Festival Week.

I wasn't quite sure what I would find when I went down to Wayne to talk to Mr. Snodgrass. I suppose I really expected some kind of unshaven off-beat character, reclining on a tattered sofa (or else tending his potted begonia) in some seedy garret office long forgotten by the rest of the fast growing university.

INSTEAD I entered an antiseptic neat room and met a handsome, bespectacled reddish haired young man (34) neatly dressed in an outfit consisting of a pair of unshaven off-beat trousers, a white shirt and a tie. He was smiling and passed morning inspection at M.I. and A.—no leather patches on the elbows of a baggy tweed jacket—not even a touch of lace at the cuffs.

Soft spoken De was born in Wilkesburg, Pennsylvania, attended Geneva college, served in the Navy, received his M.A. and M.F.A. from the State University of Iowa. He was an instructor of English at Cornell and the University of Rochester. His awards include the Ingram Merrill foundation poetry prize, the Hudson Review fellowship in poetry, the Longview foundation award, the poetry society of America citation, the National Institute of Arts and Letters grant and the already mentioned Pulitzer prize for his book of poetry "Heart's Needle".

Snodgrass has been described as "Walking through the universe... how alive he is there... and how fluently and honestly he writes about it." To quote "a realistic young poet himself": "Three years ago I could find neither a job nor a publisher; suddenly my work is receiving critical attention and major awards."

HIS SHARE in the arts festival poetry evening will consist of a combination lecture and reading preceded by varied poetry readings by some of our own Birmingham citizens. This Sunday at Dean Corbett's home interested poetry buffs will gather to discuss their favorite poems and select the best for the June 22 evening poetry event.

Snodgrass is not too far out and it certainly won't be a too arty evening in Shain Park. This will be for all of us and I'll close the poetry corner today by reminding you that William DeWitt Snodgrass won the Academy Award given by the John Barton Wolgamoot society of the University of Michigan (undergrads) for the best verse in 1960 about a men's room.
