When Is A 'Bribe' Not A Bribe, Mr. Proctor JFK?

You know that bribing a public official is an illegal bit of business. Those who do so are subject to prosecution, if discovered. They could, and many do, land in prison for varying lengths of time.

How do they do it? Simple. Promise a Congressman, in either or both the Senate and the House, a new postoffice for his district or his state; promise to allow a Congressman the right to use a committee for some political office within the gift or appointment of the Chief Executive; promise to exempt from the White House inner sanctum, to push some pet project of a Congressman through enactment, if he or she will support the White House program, in whole or in part; promise to make a grant or a loan of money for a Congressman's state or district. . . .

It is not as downright unethical to use the powers of the Presidency, together with the taxpayers' money necessary to carry out some 'promise,' as it is to use the funds of a private individual. . . .
