Charles Fergus Binns Medal Awarded to Maija Grotell

Maija Grotell, head of the ceramics department of Cranbrook Academy of Art, and an internationally famous ceramist, has been awarded the Charles Fergus Binns Medal—one of the highest honors that can be paid a ceramist.

The Charles Fergus Binns Medal is an award commemorating Dr. Binns, notable ceramist and First Director of the New York State School of Clayworking and Ceramics at Alfred University, Alfred, N. Y.

THE AWARD is made annually by Alfred University to the person who has made notable contributions "to the advancement of ceramic art and who reflects those qualities of character, ability, initiative, humility and originality so admired

by Dr. Binns." Announcement of the presentation of the award to Miss Grotell was made at a recent meeting of the General Session of the American Ceramic Society Annual Meeting in Toronto.

Miss Grotell, who throughout the years has established an outstanding record as a teacher, was born in Helsinki, Finland. She was graduated from the Central School of Industrial Art "Ateneum", Helsinki, and came to the United States in 1927.

HER FIRST summer in this country she attended summer school courses conducted by Dr. Binns at Alfred University. From 1936 to 1938 she was instructor and research assistant in the department of ceramics at Rutgers University. In 1938 she came to Cranbrook to head the ceramics department.

Among Miss Grotell's awards are the Diploma of Honor from the International Exposition Barcelona, Silver Medal from the Paris International Exposition, First Prize and Purchase Prize from the Wichita Art Association; from the Michigan Artist Craftsmen Exhibit the Lillian Henkel Haas Prize, the Material and Design Prize, the Mr. and Mrs. Harry L. Winston Prize, the Founders Society Prize, and the Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence A. Fleischman Purchase Prize.

IN ADDITION, Miss Grotell was presented the Award of Merit of the First Class in the Art of Ceramics by the Michigan Academy of Science, Arts and Letters in 1949, 1950, 1951 and 1956.

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
