Clawson Man Will Be Candidate for Con-Con

William A. O'Brien announced today that he will be a candidate in the forthcoming primary election for the Democratic nomination for delegate to the Constitutional Convention from the 12th State Senate District (Oakland County). O'Brien, 31, is a Clawson councilman who practices law with a law firm in Clawson.

He is a member of the Democratic Party's State Central Committee, representing the 12th Congressional District.

In announcing his candidacy, O'Brien emphasized his belief in the need for a new Michigan constitution that would call for reapportionment of the state legislature on the basis of people rather than geographic area.

"I BELIEVE that reapportionment is the most crucial issue presently confronting Michigan and the delegates to the October 23rd Constitutional Convention in Lansing," O'Brien said.

"I believe in a representative form of government whereby the legislature represents people, instead of cow pasture," he said.

Legislative and senatorial districts are drawn by population as the best way to elect state legislators who are truly represented and respond to the needs and desires of the people of Michigan, O'Brien believes.

HE CITES MICHIGAN'S 12th and 32nd Senatorial districts to back his charge that representation under the present constitution is basically unfair to the people of Oakland County.

The 12th Senatorial District, which is all of Oakland County, has a population approaching 700,000. This is approximately 12 times the population of the 32nd Senatorial District in the northeast part of the Upper Peninsula, O'Brien says. Yet, he points out, the 12th and the 32nd Districts each have one Senator in Lansing.

"In other words," the candidate said, "a citizen's vote in Oakland County is only one-twelfth as good as that of a citizen from the Upper Peninsula."

O'Brien was born Feb. 13, 1930, one of seven children of a Ford, Maine, warehouseman. He worked at part-time jobs ranging from neighborhood to chauffeur during his high school days. He was salutatorian of the 1947 graduation class at Chertown Classical High School in Portland.

He continued working during his four years at Holy Cross College, Worcester, Mass., where he was a waiter in the College Cafeteria. He was graduated cum laude in 1951 with a bachelor of arts degree.

An ROTC member in college, he was commissioned a U.S. Navy Ensign upon graduation. During and after the Korean War he served aboard several naval vessels as a deck officer, gunnery officer and squad communications officer.

HE HAS BEEN promoted to lieutenant commander, USNR, and is attached to Naval Intelligence Reserve Division 9.1, Detroit.

Upon his release to inactive duty in 1954, O'Brien entered Yale Law School, New Haven, Conn. There he was president of the Student Association in 1957. He won honorable mention for the C. LaRue Munson Public Defender Prize and finished his LL.B. in 1957.

During his law school years, he was an ice cream man, a janitor at Yale University and a field research assistant for the U.S. Geop. right. Office.

AFTER A YEAR with a Detroit law firm, O'Brien lectured a year at the University of Detroit Law School. He is presently associated with the Detroit legal firm of Frank, Markus, Lubbers and Slav. O'Brien was elected to the Clawson City Council in April, 1961. In 1958, O'Brien married Catharine Gallante of Norfolk, Va. The couple live at 1351 North Selfridge, Clawson, with their five children. O'Brien is immediate past-president of the Guardian Angels Parish Credit Union and past-president of the Clawson Junior Chamber.
