and firm action to preserve their country's heritage."

As guests of the Tanganyikan government, the couple visited game areas and newly created national park. Other travels took them into the gorilla country of the Kivu Volcanoes on the Uganda-Congo border.

Dr. Hatt said "we were continually in touch with local political changes" but emphasized that the trip was "zoologically oriented."

HE AND HIS WIFE were guests of Dr. and Mrs. Rudyard C. Boulton during their six weeks in Southern Rhodesia, at the reserve station. Boulton, an American, is director of the station. He visited the Cranbrook Institute in the summer of 1960.

The station itself was comfortable and contained an impressive collection of "about 30 original paintings by some of the great contemporary artists."

The reserve was populated by Africans and Asiatics and Dr. Hatt said "you never saw a town so carefully zoned."

HIS NATIVE assistant, member of the Moshombe tribe, will continue to trap and record the activities of mammals in the reserve area, Dr. Hatt said.

Thus the inventoring will continue, for the knowledge gained on this trip is the result of a continuing study made up of bits and pieces of information.

gate of ripened fruits called drupelets.

Likewise, a strawberry is not a berry. Its many seeds are cushioned on the surface of the juicy pulp. Each berry develops from a single flower and each seed is the ripened ovary of one of its numerous pistils. Botanists call this group "achenes."

ANOTHER GROUP called collective or multiple fruits join their flower clusters into what appears to be a single fruit. The mulberry and the pineapple are examples.

Yet another important group of fleshy fruits called pomes includes apples, pears and quinces. Each of these ripen from a single flower. The pulp is formed of the enlarged stem-end or receptacle upon which the flower rests and the core which encloses the seeds is the inner part of the ovary.

Fruits are low in actual food value but are important in flavor and in vitamin B and C content. In general they contain 96 to 98 per cent water, about one per cent of protein and a little more of sugar, starch and cellulose. A few, such as olives and avocados, are rich in oil.

FRUITS HAVE been an important part of man's food ever since the first savages attracted by their shapes and colors tasted them and found them good. It was the peoples of the Mediterranean region who, centuries before our era, developed and cultivated many of our wild varieties selecting the larger and sweeter kinds to plant in their gardens, vineyards or orchards.

Now the inventive hand of man never ceases in its efforts to produce new and better strains for use in all parts of the world.
