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BROOMFIELD SAID he expects further Communist attempts at domination of the Far East soon and these Red efforts could well hinge around South Korea.

"The strength and military resources of the new government of South Korea could well hold the key to Asia," said Broomfield, a member of the Far East and National Security subcommittee. "Further Red attempts at a military invasion of infiltration of South Korea pose a definite threat to Japan and our other friends in Asia." Broomfield said he had been invited to tour several military installations by Ambassador I. Kwon Choo to see for himself the preparations being made to guard against a Red assault and to survey economic progress and political freedoms under the new government.

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## Park St. Parking Poses Problem For Residents

Parking on Park St. is a problem for residents of Park St. Or at least all-day parking in the block between Oakland and Euclid is a nuisance, claim 18 residents of Park St.

In a letter to the Birmingham City Commission this week, they asked that all-day parking be prohibited on the west side of the street between Euclid and that the present two-hour limit on the east side be retained.

COMMISSIONERS directed City Manager L. R. Gare and Police Chief Herb Moxley to study and report on the request. "Gare said he felt the request 'is a reasonable one.'"

The residents contend that the street is costing the City more than \$500 per year in loss of parking meter revenue and that it is dangerous, unsightly and discriminating.

## Prof. Lynch Given Grant

M. Elizabeth Lynch, a former Birmingham resident and professor of journalism at Marygrove College in Detroit, has received a 1962-63 Fulbright grant for lecturing and research at several Brazilian universities.

She is the sister of Frank W. Lynch, 761 Covington, Birmingham. She will study the status and influence of Brazilian women in communications and public relations in connection with a national research award from Theta Sigma Phi, professional organization for women in journalism.

A LONG-TIME interest in the culture, history and language of Brazil took Professor Lynch to South America in 1953. At that time she investigated social, educational and economic situations in Sao Paulo, Brazil's fastest-growing city. She also visited Uruguay and Argentina.

She lectured to various groups in Brazil about United States affairs. Since her return she has talked to similar groups about her findings in Brazil. She has continued to study Latin American culture. The continent has assumed greater international importance.

Prof. Lynch received B.A. and M.A. degrees in journalism at Indiana University. She has done advanced work in English literature, public relations and languages. Her articles have appeared in several U. S. publications and in "Lareira," a leading Brazilian magazine.

PROF. LYNCH is listed in various directories, including "Who's Who of American Women," the "Directory of American Scholars," and "Who's Who in American Education."

The appointment was requested by Mrs. Ruth DeCou, principal.

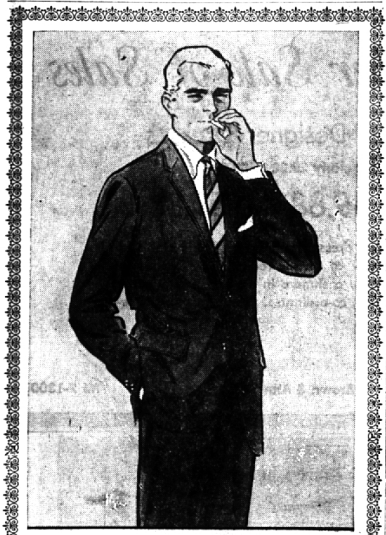
## Two Local Men Enrolled in Courses On Fallout Shelters
