American Education Week Observance Set Nov. 5-11

"Will you visit your child's school during American Education Week, Nov. 5-11? If you are like millions of people, you will. This year's observance is faced with classroom techniques and concepts unheard of a decade ago. Take this opportunity to visit your neighborhood school.
 The Michigan Education Association has announced that some 30 million adults throughout the country will observe schools in action at the beginning of a decade in which schools will undergo staggering change.
 Themed "Your Schools: Time or a Progress Report," this year's observance marks the 41st annual celebration of American Education Week.
 GOV. JOHN B. SWAINSON, in his proclamation setting the 1961 Michigan American Education Week observance, urged all people to "recognize the need for continuing excellence in training in our schools. Children should realize that Michigan offers to its students the opportunity of obtaining an education unexcelled anywhere. Therefore, they should apply themselves diligently to their studies to the benefit of themselves and the entire world. Our citizens should recognize the need for continuing support of our educational system."
 "THOUSANDS OF SCHOOL systems in Michigan the nation will open their doors to the public during American Education Week," American Education Week is an opportunity extended to educators and laymen to work together in common cause for the benefit of the children of this nation, and of the nation itself," says Dr. E. Dale Kennedy, MEA executive secretary. "Public education is a shared responsibility between those who serve in the schools and those who make the school program possible through support by taxation and contribution of services."
 American Education Week grew out of the revelation, during World War I, that a shocking percentage of the American people were illiterate and physically unfit. Representatives of the National Education Association and the newly formed American Legion discussed this problem and their talks led to the observance in 1921 of the first American Education Week. From 1922 on, the observance has been co-sponsored by the U. S. Office of Education. In 1958, the National Congress of Parents and Teachers became the fourth national sponsor.
 Many other groups are participating in the 1961 observance. Farm, labor, business, civic, religious, fraternal and general cultural organizations help plan and finance many American Education Week projects and activities.
 "THE BASIC PURPOSE of American Education Week is to make every American aware of the important role education plays in our democracy and to help him realize that good schools are his personal responsibility.
 Specific purposes are: to improve public understanding and appreciation of education; to explain the modern school; to increase pupil appreciation of their school; to reveal the problems and needs which strengthen the bonds of cooperation between school and the community.

Census Bureau Report on Troy Now Available

The Census Bureau's new publication "City Blocks '60," Michigan from the 1960 Census of Housing now is available from the Commerce Department, Michigan Office, 438 Federal Building, Detroit.
 Provided are the following types of information for each block: Total population, the number of housing units classified by condition and plumbing, tenure of occupied units, average contract rent and average number of rooms for renter occupied units, number of units occupied by non-whites, and number of units with 1.01 or more persons.
 A map included in this report identifies the boundaries of the city and shows the location and number of each block.
 An introductory section furnishes comprehensive definitions and explanations of the data presented. Changes and additions of items compared with the 1950 program are also included.
 A free listing of 421 cities, including 23 in Michigan, for which City Blocks are available can also be obtained from the Michigan Office.

No 4-Way Stop At Torry Corner, B'ham Decides

There will be no four-way stop at the Torry-Bennaville-Banbury intersection in Birmingham.
 By taking no action, city commissioners Monday night accepted a recommendation from Police Chief Ralph Moxley not to install stop signs at this time.
 Donald A. Henderson, 1588 Bennaville, had requested the signs on the Oct. 16 commission meeting. He asked for control of high speed of vehicles on Torry at the intersection.
 MOXLEY REPORTED that a police department survey during school hours on Oct. 24 showed the average speed below the 25 m.p.h. speed limit on the street. Only two cars were clocked at more than 30 m.p.h.
 Traffic volumes on the street do not indicate a need for signs, he reported.
 Stop signs now require Bennaville traffic to stop for Torry and Banbury traffic to stop for Torry.

Madison Heights Losses Bid to Join In Fire Aid Pact

Acting on advice from the city manager and the fire chief, Birmingham city commissioners Monday night rejected a Madison Heights bid to join in the South Oakland County Reciprocal Fire Aid Pact (SOCRFAP).
 An investigating committee for SOCRFAP recommended that the request be denied on the basis that if Madison Heights were to lend assistance to a neighboring city it would lack adequate protection in event a major fire broke out at home.
 All member communities of SOCRFAP must approve an application before a city can be accepted in the pact.
 Fire Chief Park Smith and City Manager R. Gare concurred in the SOCRFAP committee's recommendation.


