Grants Aid Study By MSU Faculty Of Magnetic Forces

EAST LANSING—A National Institutes of Health grant scheduled to total \$167,892 over three years will enable a Michigan State University physicist, aided by several MSU biologists, to examine the effects of magnetism on the life processes of plants and animals. Dr. Donald J. Montgomery is commencing fundamental research aimed at exploring likely connections between biological processes and magnetism. He explains that some scientists suggest magnetism can affect life by affecting the orientation and position of molecules vital to life processes, while others argue that any energy changes produced by magnetism would be swamped by other, far greater forces.
