

NATURE NOW Ring-necked Pheasant Part of Outdoor Beauty

One day in late April crossing an old overgrown field, I came upon the nest of a ring-necked pheasant. Had I not flushed the bird, I would have passed it unnoticed. I stooped to bend aside the protruding grasses and counted 17 earth-colored eggs laid in a shallow depression with only sparse lining of dried plant material.

It is the young cocks from such nests that make a prized trophy for the hunter.

THE RING-NECKED pheasant was first successfully introduced in the United States from China in 1881. It is a hardy, adaptable bird, introduced and propagated on the farm in Ingram county in the years that have followed this exotic foreign cousin of the barn yard fowl has become the most important game bird in the state.

The ring-neck prefers to live in moist thickets, meadows and around roadsides where the ground cover is thick enough for protection and nesting. Since his food is waste grain and weed seeds, our hunters must be careful to look for him on good soils such as are found in the Saginaw and Thumb areas. These sections may yield as many as 100 cocks per square mile. Three times the total population of low producing wood out farm lands, typified by many state-owned lands.

PHASANT HUNTING is a cosmopolitan sport, it is available to anyone who can venture even a few miles beyond our city limits. In an off-season the birds have become so tame they are often seen foraging in gardens within our suburban areas.

On my desk is a recent letter from the state conservation department. It reports that the Mason farm now operating on a greatly reduced scale. It has been proven that once an introduced species has been established, the number of birds released has little or no effect upon the total population.

Although pen-reared birds were originally released all over the state, the species itself has selected the areas best suited to its living needs and has colonized these up to the numbers they are able to support.
