Lathrup to Buy New Police Car, Adding Machine
LATHRUP—Council okayed purchase of a new police car and an adding machine Monday night but took no action on obtaining a fireproof safe.
The police car will cost \$1599.07. Purchase of the vehicle, a Dodge, was recommended by City Administrator Jerald Stone and Police Chief Tom Tolson.
Stone said he and the chief favored this bid, the second lowest one, because the bid for the Dodge was enough higher to give the city more value. The lowest bid was for a Plymouth.
AT \$295 the adding machine will be used for city office use, he said. He said he favored the purchase of a fireproof safe for the business procedures advisory committee. Stone said he was especially concerned about the protection of voting registrations and other city records in case of fire.
