Recreation is a big business in Birmingham.
The annual report of the recreation department shows revenues of \$110,050.58 and expenditures of \$99,664.63 for the fiscal year 1960-61.
And for an area where it seems that a large majority belong to country clubs, one might question the need for a public recreation program.
Actually, the 10 or so private clubs in the Birmingham area cater only to certain wants of their members, who often participate in the specialized program of the city.
**Your program here is a bit different than that in many other areas, "said Dom Martin, the slow-drawling antive Mississippian who directs the recreation department.
