Birmingham women may "Tour the World" in one stop at International Institute's "Old World Market" which will open four days, Thursday through Sunday, to sell the hand-crafted products of 900 volunteer workers and artisans. Volunteers from the Birmingham area assisting the general chairman at the market are Mesdames Harold McPike of W. Maple, William Fisher of Pleasant Street, Paul Penfield of Lakeside Drive, Donald Tyler of Franklin Hills, Donald Else of Captains Lane and K. Stanley Pratt of N. Woodward. The market will open the doors of its enchanting setting at 111 E. Kirby from noon to 10 p.m. Gay shops at Old World Market, set amid an array of color, music and art, will offer their handmade linens, jewelry, embroidery and decorative hand carvings from all corners of the world.

EARLY CHRISTMAS shoppers will find etched silver from India, exquisite needlework from the Ukraine, Hungary and Armenia, fine embroidery from Syria and Lebanon, pointed toe Harem slippers from Arabia, brushed pewter from Egypt and Christmas cards in many languages, along with African ritual masks to scare away demons.

For book lovers, the contents of six large wooden boxes stored in an attic for the last 50 years will be offered for sale, including old Harper's first and fifth grade readers, children's story books, early issues of World Events magazines and soft leather books of poems so popular as gifts in the 90's at the turn of the century.

INTERNATIONAL menus listing the food delicacies of Armenian, French, Filipino and Romanian dinners will be served old world style from 5 to 8 p.m., by Institute's cooks to please taste buds of the most discriminating public. Again this year gourmets will enjoy tasty treats of European and Middle Eastern culinary arts, breads, candies and pastries, torte, strudel, tass-kaba and pilaf.

The stage of the Institute's Hall of Nations will be gaily decorated with the warmth and charm of "La Cantina." The Italian canteen will feature espresso coffee and Italian sweets. During the four-day market, strolling musicians will entertain with a Gypsy violin and an Italian accordian.
