Following a reception at Glenwood Manor, the newbrides left for Minneapolis, Minn., where they will reside.

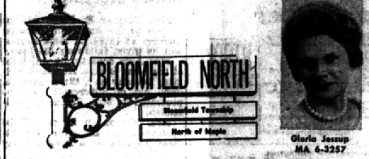
