IF WEST Bloomfield Township is called on to meet natural or civil disaster, there are some services the township is organized to provide.

WARREN IS assisted by his wife, Mrs. Edna A. Warren, volunteer job as assistant civil defense director for the West Bloomfield zone, as well as serving as Emergency Welfare Director for Oakland County and Coordinator of Welfare Services for southeastern Michigan.

CIVIL DEFENSE has eight special services which go into immediate operation in an emergency. They are communication, engineering, fire, medical, police, supply, transportation and welfare.

IN CASE OF atomic attack, some 250 township residents have been trained in radiological detection.
