### Protect Pavement, Association Asks Leaf Burners

**BLOOMFIELD VILLAGE**—In a bulletin issued this week to village residents, the Bloomfield Village Protective Association urged caution in the burning of leaves. The bulletin noted that leaves should not be burned on the new pavement.

The road reconstruction program has progressed to a point where all streets are now paved although some finishing jobs may have to be put off until spring according to the bulletin.

**THE LATTER** includes the installation of a few curbs, leveling, grading and seeding of some areas adjacent to curbs, and those small unpaved areas at a few street intersections, the bulletin said. Low spots will be adjusted as weather permits.

As regards traffic control, the association said it now has plans to work with the township and county in establishing the steps to be taken. The bulletin board noted that the association expects to work out a plan to make use of "stop" signs and "yield" signs at the appropriate street intersections.

Field telephones have been tested in township alert exercises. Eight landline phones were laid in approximately 15 minutes.

**ENGINEERING** director is Nerec Ellis. Supply director is Merritt Johnson and transportation director is Jean Carpenter.

Their duties would include clearing roads, providing emergency water, procuring and distributing supplies and transporting injured.

**BEA COVEY**, registered pharmacist, assisted by Dr. F. L. Granger is medical director. Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Stillwell are civilian coordinators.

Among the "tried and true" emergency medical procedures demonstrated at field exercises is the setting up of a 200-bed emergency hospital at West Bloomfield High School. Dr. John P. Williams is station head of the hospital, assisted by Dr. Granger.

At present, a fourth medical emergency course with 128 enrollees is being held in the township. Besides many local residents who have received this instruction, numerous residents of other areas have been trained here and gone back to instruct in their own areas.

BECAUSE OF the numerous activities directed under emergency warfare, there are three heads of this service — Mrs. Harry Parker, Mrs. William David and Mrs. Merritt Johnson.

Emergency warfare has charge of lodging, clothing, mass feeding and registration and information.

**MRS. DAVID** has charge of mass lodging. Housing facilities for 44,500 refugees are available in township schools, barns, community houses, roller rinks, bowling

alleys, theaters, warehouses, churches, the library and the VFW Hall.

Two-car garages could be used to house 57,000 additional evacuees.

**MASS FEEDING** is under the direction of Cecil Davis, who also serves in this capacity for Oakland County and southeastern Michigan.

Rotunda Inn would be a central kitchen to prepare two hot meals a day for disaster victims. All country clubs in the area are organized for the mass feeding program. Wilkins Inn has been designated as a special diet kitchen.

**DORIS JONES** is in charge of mass clothing. In natural disaster Red Cross would handle this job, but in civil disaster, civil defense would have charge with full utilization of Red Cross and the Salvation Army.

Mrs. Dorothy Chamberlain, township clerk, is in charge of registration and information. Her job is clearing information to reunite family groups.

ALMOST 1,000 residents are trained in emergency warfare. It indicated deep interest in "being prepared"—which is simply what civil defense means.
