Franklin Negotiates Settlement in Suit

FRANKLIN — Confronted with a negative opinion from Circuit Court Judge Stanton Dondoro in the suit of Mrs. Fidelia Sparr against the village, Franklin's council deliberated Monday to evaluate a compromise settlement.

Mrs. Sparr contended the village's right to rezone her property on Northwestern at the northeast corner of Inkster Road, from commercial to residential. The rezoning occurred when the village adopted its zoning code shortly after incorporation. Mrs. Sparr and her late husband, William, protested the action before the council several times. After her husband's death last year, Mrs. Sparr took the matter into court.

THE LAND involved in litigation is lot 36, a triangular piece of land, originally zoned by Southfield Township as commercial for 250 feet from Northwestern.

A report of testimony at the trial indicated Mrs. Sparr has been paying commercial property taxes to the township all through the years. Witnesses for Mrs. Sparr stated that the property was probably worth about \$40,000 as a business site, but would only bring about \$1,000 as a residential lot.

The compromise agreement would include a 10 to 14 foot greenbelt to insulate adjoining properties, all of which are residential.

Village President Calvert Thomsen said, "Negotiations are presently going on between opposing counsel, preparatory to drafting a judgment to be entered by the court, reflecting the opinion of the judges."

Representatives from the Rosemond Hills Estate Association who attended the meeting, urged that the compromise proposal.

TRAFFIC CONDITIONS in the village at the height of the annual cider season will be in for some serious study. Alarmed by the rumor that the Franklin Cider Mill expects to enlarge its parking facilities possibly creating more congestion at the corner of 14 Mile and Franklin roads, the council advised Marshal John Donaldson that "something would be done."

Donaldson reported that his volunteer police put in 30 hours of duty diverting and directing traffic coming through the village on the weekend before Halloween.

RICHARD OBERSCHEUTE of Colony Hill recommended that the council prepare a proposal to appear on the March ballot which would enable local areas or neighborhoods to finance blocktopping in a four or five year period instead of a cash-on-the-line basis as now exists.

Voters turned down a similar bonding proposal when it appeared with the successful eight-mill road tax issue three years ago. However, there is increased interest in having roads block-topped since road beds have been improved during this time. Advisory road committees have consistently urged hard surfacing be done while benefits from the eight-mill projects are most effective.

POLICE SAID Carlstrom, driving to his gas station at the southeast corner of Northwestern and Telegraph, struck the rear of a truck trailer driven by George Barney, 40, of Toledo. Barney said police he was slowing for a traffic light and his speed was no more than 20 miles.

The accident occurred at 1:22 a.m. Both men were driving south on Northwestern.
