An 8" water main on Sunnyslope Drive from 14 Mile Road to Nurwood Place; on Norwood Place from Sunnyslope Drive to existing 6" main on Riverside Drive; on Kennoway Circle from Kennoway Court to 13 Mile Road; on Kennoway Court from Kennoway Circle to south end of Lot 27 "Kennoway #1," on Stafford Drive from Lahser Road to 13 Mile Road; on Evergreen Road from 13 Mile Road to Embassy Drive; on Embassy Drive from 13 Mile Road to Evergreen Road; on Marimor Drive from Coryell Drive to Stellamar Drive; on Leomoor Drive from South Village Limits to Stellamar Drive; on Stellamar Drive from South Village Limits to 13 Mile Road; on Woodhaven Lane from South Village Limits to Vernon Drive; on Vernon Drive from South Village Limits to 13 Mile Road; on Plantation Lane from Evergreen Road to Embassy Drive; on Coryell Drive from Embassy Drive to Marimor Drive; on Vernon Court from Embassy Drive to East line Lot 42 "Berkshire Valleys #1"; then along said East line Lot 42 to N.E. corner of said Lot 42; thence, on Normandale Court to Lahser Road.

A 6" water main on Kennoway Circle from 13 Mile Road to Kennoway Court; on Marlin Court from 13 Mile Road to end of Marlin Court; on Edwood Drive from Evergreen Road to Embassy Drive; on Coryell Drive from Evergreen Road to Embassy Drive; on Billington Court from Vernon Drive to end of court; on Wendbrook Lane from 13 Mile Road to end of Wendbrook Lane; on Buttonwood Court from Embassy Drive to end of court; on Marimor Drive from Coryell Drive to South Village Limits; along South line of Lots 57, 56, and 57 "Kennoway Meadows #1," along south line of Lots 21 and 22 "Kennoway Meadows," along south line of Lots 81 and 82 "Berkshire Valleys #3," along West line Lot 82 "Berkshire Valleys #3" to S.E. corner Lot 94 "Berkshire Valleys #3"; on South line Lot 94 "Berkshire Valleys #3" from S.E. corner Lot 94 to Vernon Drive; on Orcutt Court from Vernon Drive to end of court; on Gates Court from Normandale Court to end of Gates Court; on Hilltop Court from Lahser Road to West line TBH 110 in N.E. 1/4, Section 9; on Hillview Lane from Lahser Road to North line TBH 112, N.E. 1/4, Section 9.

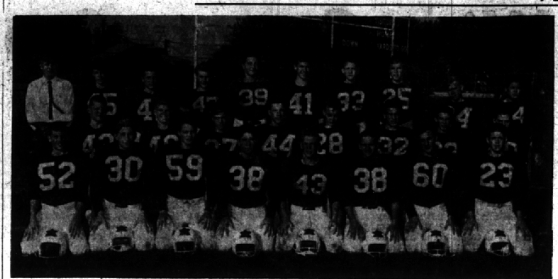
The Village Council has determined that all or a part of the cost of the above described water main public improvement shall be assessed against each lot and parcel of land abutting the above described water mains.

Ask Change In Amusement Law in B'ham

Birmingham city commissioners have referred to the City's legal counsel to amend the ordinance regulating amusements.

Jack Hanna, a Clawson attorney representing Mars Coffee Shop at 1383 S. Woodward, Birmingham, asked for an amendment that would establish permits on a permanent rather than the present temporary basis.

Under the current law, an initial \$5 fee is charged plus \$1 per day for a period of 30 days.

When the 30 days is up, a new permit must be obtained at the same rates.

MARS COFFEE Shop has twice paid the fees on this basis for a group of amateur musical entertainers, who appear nightly at the drive-in restaurant.

Hanna said that "this situation is somewhat inconvenient" for both Mars and the City.

He proposed an amendment that would establish an initial fee of \$5 together with a \$1 per day fee but with a maximum annual fee of \$100 for a period exceeding six months.

City Manager L. R. Gare was told to confer with the legal counsel on the matter.

B'ham to Continue In Roads Group

Birmingham will continue to contribute to support of the Michigan Good Roads Federation, city commissioners decided Monday night.

They authorized payment of \$13 to the Michigan Municipal League to sustain the City's voluntary membership in the federation.

The Good Roads Federation coordinates the efforts of groups interested in adequate highways for Michigan. It is under the supervision of the board of trustees of the municipal league.

Municipal Building Electric Service To Be Improved

Birmingham City Hall is in for some improved electric service.

"We have experienced considerable trouble . . . with the lights not functioning properly due to the voltage drop within the building," reported Assistant City Manager R. S. Kenning.

The Detroit Edison Co. has run several tests on our system and has stated that the problem can be solved only by the installation of a transformer adjacent to the municipal building.

KENNING ASKED city commissioners Monday night for an appropriation for the improvement.

They accepted the low bid of \$1,985 from Kramer Electric, Hazel Park.

Rapid Reading Course Starts On Saturday

A 10-week course in rapid reading is being offered at the Birmingham Community House with the first class scheduled for Saturday, Nov. 18.

The adult course is designed to improve the efficiency of reading skills and will include training in accelerated individual reading speeds and in comprehension.

Ward Ouradnik, executive director of the Community House, said Anthony P. Witham, reading consultant and supervisor for Genesee County, Flint, will be the instructor.

Witham is a member of the board of directors of the Flint-area Reading Council, associate editor for the Michigan Reading Association and a part-time reading instructor for various universities.

BECAUSE OF the individualized nature of the course, Witham said the Community House class will be limited to 15. Tests will be administered before and at the conclusion of the course to determine individual progress.

Necessary requisites for obtaining maximum benefit from the course include a desire for self-improvement, time to read at least one hour daily at home, and a willingness to follow the training requirements.

The fee for the course is \$30. Classes will be held each Saturday from 1-2:30 p.m.
