MEA Votes Welcome Of Earmarked Funds

LANSING—The Michigan Education Association will support earmarked funds for education and recommend that the controlling boards for the state educationally established universities remain the same, George N. Lauer, MEA president, said in an address.

The MEA board of directors has voted association support of "earmarked funds for education sufficient to the degree that the state educational program will in no way be impaired beneath its present level."

In addition, the MEA "urges and encourages adequate earmarking of funds to greatly improve the existing program."

Action was also taken by the board to recommend that controlling boards for the University of Michigan, Wayne State University, and Michigan State University remain the same or be retained.
