

## Sarah Schlachter Weds Dennis B. Robertson

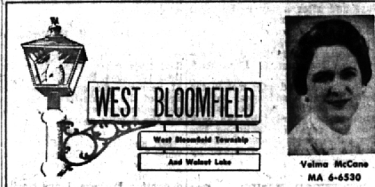

## Local Clubs To Observe Railroad Week

Two groups of hobbyists in the Birmingham area will hold open house at their club model railroads next week as part of the observance of National Model Railroad Week, Nov. 26 through Dec. 2.

The event is sponsored by the National Model Railroad Association, Inc., a world-wide organization of 15,000 members, for the purposes of introducing the fascinating craft of scale model railroading to the public and potential hobbyists, and to assist beginners in getting started on the right track.

THE SOUTHFIELD Model Railroad Club, with quarters at 22112 Keeler, Southfield, will be open to the public on Sunday, between 10 a.m. and 5 p.m.

The South Oakland County Model Railroad Club, which meets in the G.T.W. station in Birmingham, will be open Dec. 2 between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. and again in the evening between 7 and 9.

BOTH OF THE model railroads are under construction but will have some trains in limited operation. These model industrial empires are built to HO scale, 1/87th full size, which reduces a mile of track to about 60 feet.

In contrast to most of the ready-to-run toy trains, they are accurately scaled and detailed miniatures, often built up entirely by hand from raw materials.

The members will be on hand at both clubs to explain details of construction and answer visitor's questions, and they will conduct an informal clinic to assist novices in the solution of their problems.
