### American Motors Promotes Coupe

### Held One of 35 To Study Shelters

Problems of selecting buildings suitable for nuclear fallout shelters were discussed recently by Arthur L. Held Jr., 231 Larchlea, Birmingham, of Giffels & Rosetti, Inc., Detroit, and Prof. John W. Briscoe, associate head, Department of Illinois civil engineering department, during a special two-week course given at the university on request of U. S. Department of Defense.
