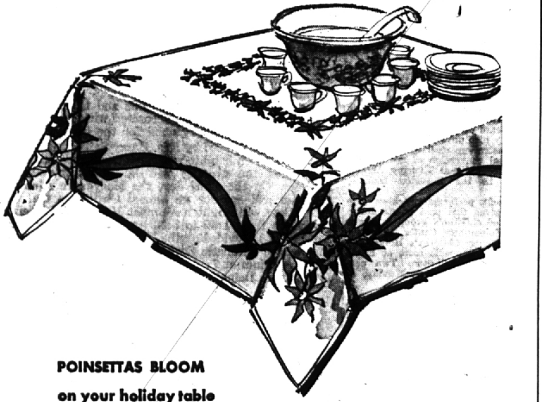

Start the tail high on the head to minimize this. And don't stretch the scalp severely while doing it.

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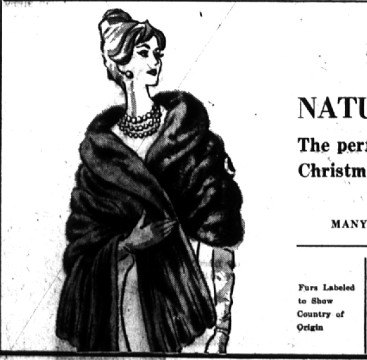
