They appeared in coral velvet dresses designed with bell-shaped skirts and carried nosegays of white, coral and pink carnations.

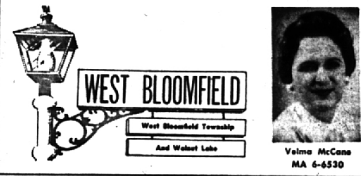
