ACCORDING TO the information reported by the inventor of the strongest area of Birmingham's program is Traffic Courts which carried 89 of 100 points and the weakest area was Organization for Traffic Safety Improvements which received only four out of 100 points.

This is the one category that hurt," said Hrebec of the Organization for Traffic Safety Improvements category. Including an organized traffic safety activities within a community, this area sharply decreased from 51 points in 1958 to four points in 1960.

HREBEC EMPHASIZED the need for some kind of community organization to "sell safety" by devising various safety projects aimed at informing and educating the public.

In the past Birmingham has had various types of traffic safety groups but they eventually died out, said Moxley. "I would like to see a permanent safety organization established, providing enough interest is generated in such a group," he said. Moxley said several local groups have indicated an interest in developing some kind of traffic safety organization and formation of such a council or committee will be considered.

PROJECTS, SAID Moxley, such as the recent Governor's Traffic Safety Conference in Birmingham, will help boost the community's future inventory ratings, but a central planning group for traffic safety is needed for local Birmingham problems.

Numerous recommendations for improvements in the various traffic safety program categories were outlined in the National Safety Council's analysis of the inventory. They concerned accident records, traffic engineering, police traffic courts, school safety organization and organization for traffic safety improvement.

Radio Program to Feature B'ham Community Life

John Lynker, WJZ disc jockey at Eastland Shopping Center, will emcee the program and introduce Birmingham's seven speakers.

Speakers will be: ROBERT A. THOM, a noted Birmingham artist presently developing a motion picture of the history of Birmingham in its log cabin days, will present the historical and cultural aspects of the community.

Donald Martin, Birmingham director of the Department of Recreation, will discuss recreational activities and family participation within the community.

HARVEY A. KREBGE, manager of the S. Kreger store in Birmingham and past president of the Birmingham Chamber of Commerce, will speak on business and service

clubs. Ward Ouradnik, executive director of the Birmingham Community House, will comment on Community House activities.

Mrs. Florence H. Willett, Mayor of Birmingham, will open and close the discussions with remarks on present conditions and future hopes of the community.

The commission also has ruled that it has now power to over-rule CFW's plan to drop two commuter trains as long as it continues at least two in each direction every day.

ABANDONMENT OF a train that leaves Detroit at 6:15 p.m. was regarded as more serious, because it has been carrying about 8,000 passengers a month and because it has provided a good back stop for people unable to catch the 5:25 p.m. train, the commission said.
