Birmingham volunteer researchers of the American Cancer Society's Southeastern Michigan Division have launched the second local followup of the Society's nationwide six-year Cancer Prevention Study.

Local residents are among more than 20,000 Tri-County residents who will be contacted by society volunteers to determine the deaths that have occurred in the Study group during the past year. Death certificates will be obtained and those listing cancer as the cause will be followed up by the society through the deceased's physician who will be asked to furnish details.
