**Dr. Chernov 1st Speaker In Altrusa Club Series**

Leading off Birmingham Altrusa Club's series of benefit lectures will be Dr. Melvin Chernov, assistant professor of history at Michigan State University, Oakland.

Dr. Chernov will analyze the east German elections and discuss implications of an independent East Germany in a lecture at 8:15 p.m. Oct. 10 at Birmingham Community House.

Dr. Chernov is a specialist in 19th and 20th century European history, particularly German history.

Altrusa Club is sponsoring three benefit lectures under the theme of "Challenges to a Changing World," conducted by the office of continuing education at MSU.

Proceeds will go to the Kenney Foundation Equipment Fund.

"Latin America, Friend or Foe?" will be the Nov. 14 topic of Dr. Samuel Shapiro, MSU assistant professor of history.

Rev. Bailey will teach a course on "The Unfolding Drama of the Bible" to meet the ever-growing interest of people in the Bible, and to provide for church school staff background material on the school's fall quarter theme, "Book of Books."

Rev. Fenner will instruct his class on "Answering Your Questions About the Christian Faith," taking a different question each week.

**Extension of Freeway Into County Under Study**

State highway officials are in the process of studying possible location for an east-west freeway from Center to Southfield in Oakland County.

State Highway Commissioner John G. Mackie announced recently that preliminary engineering studies indicate that the "probable location" of Interstate 696 in Macomb County will be along 11 Mile Road between Center Line and Roseville.

He said alternative locations for the stretch into Oakland are still being studied.

**THE 24-MILE** freeway, estimated to cost \$130 million, will extend from the east edge of Novi to Roseville, linking Interstate routes 94 and 96.

Construction of an eight-mile section from 1-96 at Novi to the North-western-T-e-l-e-g-r-a-p-h interchange started recently and is scheduled to be completed by 1968 at an estimated cost of \$16.5 million.

The remaining 16 miles from the interchange to Roseville, which will cost more than \$100 million, is scheduled to be built after 1967.

Mackie announced the tentative location of a six-mile section from Center Line to Roseville in a letter

to Malcolm F. Waring of Waring and Johnson, Planning Consultants for the City of Centerline.

HE ALSO wrote Gordon Barbell, of Berkeley, chairman of the Oakland County Interstate 696 Freeway Committee, to report that the highway department still is studying alternate routes for a 10-mile section of the freeway in Oakland County.

"This is to assure you that we are still in the process of studying alternative locations in Oakland County and that the location in

Macomb County between the New York Central Railroad and Interstate 94 leaves us completely flexible to choose either 10-Mile or 11-Mile as the general location for I-696 from the New York Central tracks west into Oakland and across the county to the interchange between Northwestern, Telegraph and I-696.

"We expect to complete our preliminary studies for the Oakland County section within a few months. We will then meet with you and the other members of your committee to discuss the alternative routes and their effect on the communities."

**Zollner Corp. Names Bowser to Board**
