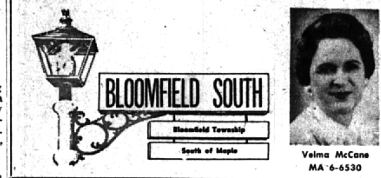
Book Review Given
