Mr. Fleisher is among the most distinguished of contemporary American pianists. He was born in San Francisco in 1903. At the age of 10 the great Artur Schnabel heard him and broke a long standing rule of not accepting pupils under the age of 16. Mr. Fleisher then studied with Mr. Schnabel for the next decade.

HE MADE his orchestral debut with Pierre Monteux and the San Francisco Symphony in 1943, and a year later Monteux presented him with the New York Philharmonic. He has since played with leading symphonies throughout the world and on the solo concert stage.

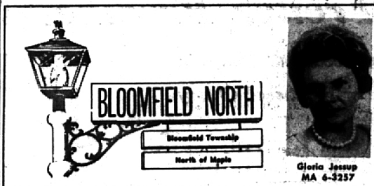
