

**Name 4 Trustees
For Public Safety
Retirement Program**

BEVERLY HILLS — Four men were named trustees of the Beverly Hills public safety retirement system Monday. The trustee board calls for one concilman, one village resident and two public safety officers.

Councilman Hugh G. Allerton Jr. was appointed to the board as a council representative. Council President Marvin B. Cline is an ex-officio member of the board.

ROBERT A. Benton, Jr., 19810 Redmore, the citizen member, is a partner in an investment firm and a village resident for 10 years. Sigs. Fred Bielman and Thomas Good will represent the village public safety department.

villagers. Some indicated, however, that it would be beneficial if the county would pave 14 Mile on through to Lahser.

COUNCILMAN LEO J. Linsenmeyer, chairman of the village's road commission, said he feels there are great advantages to the county's plan. He foresees the county's program paving Pierce, Beverly and maybe Evergreen, plus installing curb and gutters on 14 Mile and Greenfield to help prevent flooding—all done at once—if the money problem can be solved.

LINSENMEYER SAID that he and the village road commission will meet Tuesday. They may meet with Birmingham on the 14 Mile situation, he added. Beverly Hills' decision is due to the county by the next meeting on Oct. 16.

LATHRUP councilmen heard more about the city's role in the project last night at a meeting with the county road commission representatives. Lathrup is involved in two parts of the plan: 1. Southfield — widen to five lanes from Northwestern to 14

Mile Road. The total cost would be \$1,050,000. Lathrup's share would be \$38,000. A 12-lane widening to four lanes from Southfield to Greenfield. About one-quarter of this stretch is in Lathrup. The total cost would be \$120,000. Lathrup's share would be \$3,750.

WAITING UNTIL the meeting last night, Lathrup officials didn't make much comment at the meeting Monday. Mayor Pro Tem Elizabeth Mitchell, however, echoed City Administrator Jerald Stone's sentiments: "We are highly in favor of this program, if someone can tell us where to get the money."

Lathrup has no funds available and a special millage wouldn't stand a chance in the estimation of Mayor Richard N. Cogger. There is not enough money available from gas and weight taxes, Cogger said, and that money must be used to allow Lathrup to maintain its own roads.

THE MAYOR SAID people in Lathrup are generally not in favor of widening Southfield though the widening of 12 Mile Road probably wouldn't bother them much. Cogger said he had the impression council members were divided on the proposal.

Southfield Road splits the city of Lathrup right down the middle, Cogger said, creating special traffic problems.

His personal opinion on the proposal, especially as it relates to Southfield Road, awaits some answers to certain questions, about cross traffic, especially pedestrian traffic. The mayor said he would like to know if overpasses or underpasses on Southfield Road would be provided.

LATHRUP SCHOOL, located on Southfield, is the center of many recreational as well as school activities. The crossing at this point is dangerous as it is, Cogger added. He noted that the office center near 14 Mile on Southfield Road causes difficulty and said "it would be worth your life to cross Southfield here if it were a four or five lane highway."

Summing up, Cogger said, "I can't say I'm in favor of it until I know more." AT THE SAME TIME, Cogger said he knows of no other solution. The widening of the road in the Southfield City would create a traffic jam in Lathrup. The people in Lathrup, he said, recognize something has to be done. The problem is, they wish it weren't so.

**Two Pontiac Men
Held Pending Trial
In Larceny Case**

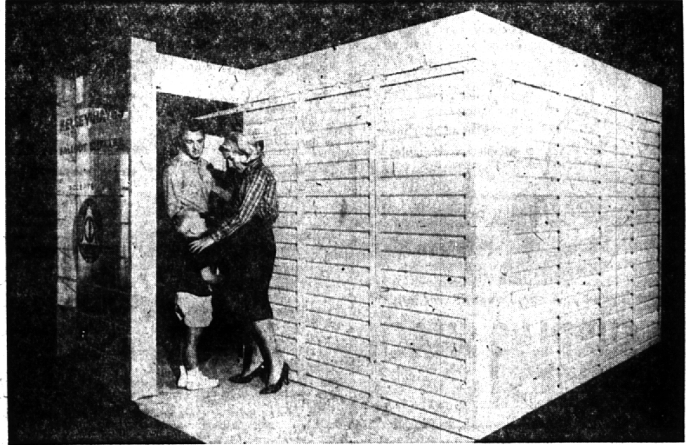
BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP — Two Pontiac men are being held in Oakland County jail in lieu of bond following appearances before circuit Judge H. Russell Holland. Arthur C. Hewitt pleaded not guilty Tuesday to larceny from a building. Bond was set at \$2,500. John Monjeau stood mute Sept. 26 and was unable to post \$1,500 bond.

THE ALLEGED offense occurred Sept. 15 at W. T. Grant Co. in the Miracle Mile shopping center. Hewitt and Monjeau were apprehended by police who said each one was wearing a jacket tried on earlier in the store.

Both men were bound over to circuit court following appearances before Township Justice of the Peace Alice Gilbert. No trial dates were set.

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
