Beck goes on to explain that the whoops that rang through the hills around Ohiyesa on the weekend of Sept. 21 and 22 were real enough, but that they were coming from otherwise perfectly civilized tribes belonging to the Birmingham YMCA father-son Indian Guides.

"Nary a scalp was lifted," said Beck, "although there was one instance of violence when two canoes collided while racing. One overturned, and the big brave and little brave manning it, or rather manning and boying it, were soaked—heap good."

Orion Schultz and son Brain of the Arapaho Tribe won the canoe race, retaining the trophy paddle they had won the year before. Heat-winners in the canoe race were Harry Wetzielafer and son Scott of the Ute Tribe and Lowell Schlichbach and Trevor Hall of the Sauk Tribe.

LARRY HARDING of the Pawnee Tribe won the bow-and-arrow tournament, splitting the bulls-eye. Members of the Hupa Tribe entered the best collection in the nature-study contest, although one seven year old Ute thought the judges robbed him. He had spent most of the two days of the camp-out in the shallows of the lake stalking and capturing a fierce one-inch catfish. He was placated finally by being allowed to take his fish home, where it now swims majestically and a bit contemptuously among goldfish.

"The little craves had a wonderful time," said Beck, "and the big braves are recuperating fast. The Biloxi and Hopi, Cayuga and all the other tribes in the Birmingham Log-House are eager to hit the trail for one more camp-out before snow falls."
