A 25-0 Detroit Country Day football win in itself is almost enough to rate quite a few inches of space.

Besides the big Saturday win, there are other facets of the Beverly Hills school's athletic program which merit comment.

The school is not noted for its "brawn", rather for its "brain." There are stringent academic requirements necessary for entrance to the hallowed halls of the school. It's possible to spend all 12 years of one's pre-college schooling, there, in the same building.

So, if anything, the coaches become well acquainted with their stalwarts.

A fellow called "Doc" Snelling is one of the two football coaches. The other is John "Pops" Poplawski, a one-time sticky-fingered end for the now tartarous Tartars of Wayne State U.

Athletic director is a handsome, 26-year-old former U-D athlete, Dick Anderson. He is the man who holds the reigns of the sometimes horseless carriage.

Twenty-three-year-old John Chandler is wrestling and tennis coach. He was a nationally ranked netter while at Denison College.

Paul Phillips, a football and track star at Amherst, coaches ninth grade football and 7th and 8th grade baseball. He is former athletic director and football coach.

The golf coach is a man with the suspicious name of Jim Doe.

And rounding out the list is part-time coach, former U-D cage star Tom Villumiere.

Sounds like a well-rounded staff with experience to spare.

### HERE'S THE TWIST

"Doc" Snelling is headmaster of the school. That is, what is in other schools called Principal. While at Bowdoin College he made small College All-American in football both as a junior and senior.

The easy-going 30-year-old has an AB in Mathematics, an MA in Education and a Ph.D. in Mathematics-Education. He feels that a teacher-coach has an opportunity to bring about an intimate tie between the classroom and the athletic field.

To this end, he has surrounded himself with a number of "teacher-coaches."

Athletic director Anderson is also an instructor of psychology and physiology.

Poplawski teaches government and social studies. Chandler is an English teacher.

Phillips is assistant headmaster.

Doe is an instructor of physics and chemistry.

Dr. Snelling is the speaker: "I prefer to work with intellect and average physical make up. We say things twice on the athletic field, and the boys perform. We don't have to repeat an order 10 times. We are developing spirit, and I trust the tide is now turning."

The title? A history of won-loss records which has very few wins.

The school has withdrawn from the tough Central-Suburban league where many schools are at least Class B. Country Day is Class D.

Dr. Snelling and Anderson both feel that with competition now on a more even keel, the Yellow Jackets will begin to lose their reputation for being soft touches.

## Barons Bombed, 27-6

# Northville Is 'Endsville' for B'field Streak

Bloomfield Hills Coach Don Hoff found out a few things while observing Friday's contest against Northville:

1. Steve Juday is a good quarterback.

2. Tom Swis is a good halfback.

3. Northville won 27-6.

Juday is being groomed for possible all-state honors. The senior quarterback did everything but turn on the lights during Northville's surprising victory. Surprisingly, it is, to Bloomfield fans, players and possibly Hoff.

With its third straight win of the season, Northville has jumped to fifth place in unofficial rankings of Class B schools.

NORTHVILLE Coach Ron Horvath unveiled the other half of the "touchdown twins" in the form of halfback Tom Swis who drove to 90 yards on 10 carries and scored one of the four touchdowns.

Juday scored twice on short plunges, completed 8 of 10 passes for 90 yards, intercepted one and punted three times with better than 30 yards on each kick.

Bloomfield Hills was completely left out of the picture as Northville scored three times in the first half.

Swis opened the scoring in the first quarter as their team marched 66 yards to paydirt.

Juday's two scores came in the second quarter. His sneaks of three and one yards capped drives of 89 and 55 yards respectively.

Runs of 38 and 27 yards by

Swis set up the TD's.

FULLBACK JOE Jay plunged from the one for Northville's final score in the third quarter. At this time the tally was 20-0 and the Barons had all but packed their plunkins.

Steady halfback Roger Stewart scampered 52 yards in the last quarter to set up Hill's only touchdown.

Quarterback Brian O'Neil went into the end zone from the one for the six-pointer. Stewart ran across for the extra point.

The morale-turning point in the game probably came in the first quarter when Art Trezenna intercepted a Juday pass only to have the theft nullified because of interference.

At the time, Northville had

driven to the Baron 10 yard line. They scored shortly thereafter, breaking the lead.

Northville now is all alone at the top of the Wayne-Oakland League standings with a 5-0 record. Hills is 1-1.

THE BARONS move to Clarenceville for a Friday night contest at 8 p.m. The Trojans have yet to lose, after a tie in their opener and an upset over Clarkston, 19-18, last week.

For Friday's contest, Hoff will have to alter his defense to stop the antics of speedy Ron Hiding, a senior halfback for Clarenceville.

To supplement the running of Hiding, Coach Lynn Nutter calls on a 190-plus average line to stop the Barons.

## Groves Gridders Drive to 50-0 Victory

All season long opposing coaches have said that the Groves football team is bound to explode.

It happened Friday.

The Falcon gridders drove their first game of the season in somewhat convincing fashion—50-0 over Whitefish Lake.

With its first senior class, Groves was boasting a team solid with experience, and, in fact, Groves had played together since grade school days.

Other scorers were Tim Mitchell on a 60-yarder in the third quarter, Dick Clark on a 10-yard fumble recovery and run and Bob Wright on a 40-yard pass from Clark.

AN IMPORTANT member of the quartet is Art Schueler. Long noted for his speed, he ran the 100-yard dash in 8.8, the feet-footed halfback crashed for four touchdowns on runs of 66, 71, 33 and 20 yards.

The Falcons scored 20 points in the hectic first quarter, 18 in the third and 12 more in the last period.

Other scorers were Tim Mitchell on a 60-yarder in the third quarter, Dick Clark on a 10-yard fumble recovery and run and Bob Wright on a 40-yard pass from Clark.

CLARK, WHO took over from regular quarterback Bill Faulds, threw another touchdown pass, sophomore end Bill Stephenson for the last tally. Stephenson added two extra points.

The Whitmore game could be considered a tuneup for the Falcons. They open their first League season tomorrow at Seaholm field against Dearborn Riverdale.

With the football season Groves officially starts competition in the near future.

Other schools in the conference are Dearborn, Eastland, and Farmington.

LAST YEAR, Groves won its final four games, two of which were over league members, Eastland and Dearborn.

Being considered favorites in the loop are the Falcons and Riverdale.

But everything else being equal, each team has a chance. All schools are relatively new, some yet do not have senior classes.

Competition is also slated for basketball and baseball. There is no league schedule in swimming.

Coach Carl Pendrack will probably count on his experienced backfield and fleet-footed Schueler to strike quickly and stay ahead.

Along with Schueler, those in the backfield are fullback, Steve Moore, who stands at 6-1, 195;

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Larry Huffman, left half, 6-1, 180; Faulds, 5-11, 178; and Clark.

LISTED ON the offensive line are the two big ends, senior Norm Starnes, 6-7 and Stephenson, 6-2, 183. At the tackles will be co-captain Bob Gline, 6-9, 208; and Brown, 6-9, 208.

Probable starters at the guard positions will be Pete Smith, 6-8, 148; and Don Novak, 6-11, 183. Center will probably be Tom Mourning, 6-0, 193.

Of the 11 probable starters, seven are seniors, three juniors, and one sophomore.

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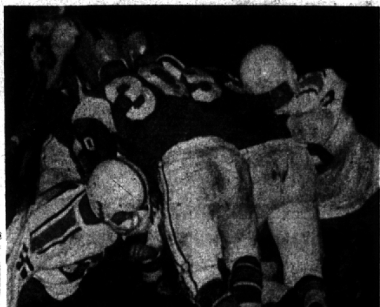
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## Fortress Gives Way
