

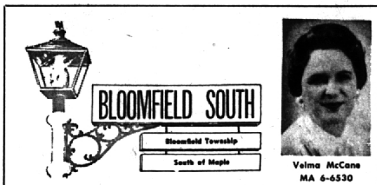

Art for Young Collectors Exhibition

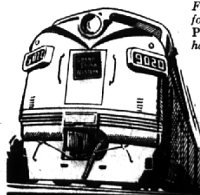

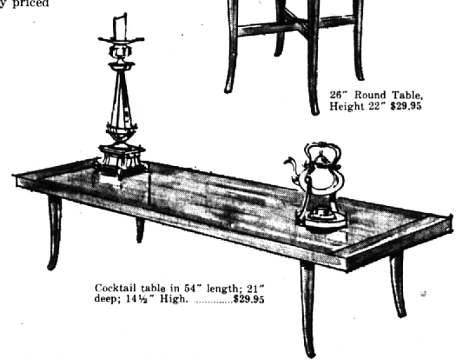
