PTA members will also vote on an amendment to the organization's charter. The meeting will be conducted by president Martin Lawrence.

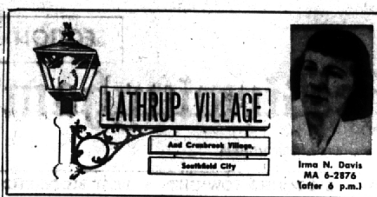
MRS. GERALD ISHAM, social chairman, will be assisted by mothers of first grade children, as refreshments are served after the meeting.

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25 Youngsters Attend New Church Nursery

CRANBROOK VILLAGE — Off to an auspicious start was the nursery program at St. Bede's Church with Mr. and Mrs. Paul Rabaut in charge. They counted some 25 pre-school youngsters present in the nursery during the first session, which enabled parents to attend the 2:30 mass together.

The youngsters meet in two of the school rooms and the project is one sponsored by the local church's Christian Family Movement. Parents may be interested in knowing that even new babies are eligible—just bring a bassinot or cotter-babe to suit the need.

There's a new bridge club in the village which will meet the first Thursday of each month and counts among its members, eight local girls.

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The group selected will be limited to a maximum of six in order to give maximum attention to each individual. All participants are expected to enter our business on a full time basis on completion of the study course.

Men and women are both eligible. Women may have no previous business experience but should be active in club, church, political or social activities.

Men may come from any field, obviously salesmen in other fields are likely candidates but others may have the personalities and abilities necessary to be successful in the real estate field. Each applicant will be carefully screened for requisite aptitudes before acceptance for training.

In general, we think the ideal age of participants is between 30 and 50—but others may be considered. Each should be seeking, and willing to work for, success beyond the norm. They should require or desire a 5-figure income. Candidates should be good self-organizers and self-starters, cheerful and optimistic by nature.

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
